Welcome to the Year 9 Options Booklet.

You are now embarking on one of the most important decisions of your educational career. Making sure you pick the Key Stage 4 courses that are right for you will make a big difference to the next two years and beyond. Getting it right will help you to finish Year 11 with a great set of GCSE results; getting it wrong will put that at risk. It may affect whether or not you are able to attend university. Once your choices have been made and agreed upon, it will be very difficult to change them.

You will be working on the KS4 courses you choose throughout Year 10 and 11 (starting in September 2025). Key Stage 4 has always been demanding, however, the 'strengthened' GCSEs that the government have introduced, are even more challenging. This means you must now be even more confident that you like the subjects you have chosen, and that you know you can do well in them. If either of these is not true, you will find life at Preston Manor over the next two years more difficult.

Steps to Successful Choices

You will be able to choose from a wide range of courses and qualifications. You will need to choose your courses wisely depending on your interests, strengths and your aspirations beyond Year 11.

STEP 1 Attend Options Evening on Thursday 30th January at 5.00pm. Ensure that the courses you choose are:

- Subjects you are interested in and those that fit with your future plans.
- Subjects you enjoy and will keep your attention for two years.
- Subjects you are being successful in (if you are studying them in Years 7-9). Use your latest Progress Report to check the subjects you are being successful in.

STEP 2 Read about the different courses in this booklet and decide which ones best suit you by:

- Look at the topics covered. Does this interest you?
- Check what you can go on and study in the future. Might this be something you want to do?
- Look at the type of courses on offer BTEC, OCR National and GCSE and consider the different assessments of these courses and which will suit you best.

STEP 3 Speak to your teacher and ask questions about the course. Speak with older students about their experiences of the course but remember this is only their view **NOT** yours!

STEP 4 Complete the Options Form and bring it in for your Options Interview.

DO NOT CHOOSE A SUBJECT FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS:

- You like the teacher
- Your friends are taking that subject
- You feel the subject is easier than others (all subjects are equally challenging)
- A member of your family studied it

Frequently Asked Questions

Once I make my selection am I guaranteed my option choices?

No. We shall of course try our best to get you your first choice subjects however this may not be possible. If not enough students choose to do a subject, it may have close down and your reserve choice will be selected. If this happens you and your family will be informed by the school.

What if I do not get my first choices?

Your reserve choice will then be selected. This is why you must pick a reserve choice in each block.

What are English Baccalaureate subjects?

An English Baccalaureate is not a qualification. It is a term used to describe a number of GCSE subjects that the government considers to be highly valued. Top tier Universities desire this in order to apply due to the breadth of curriculum that it results in. Subjects include English, Maths, Science (including Biology, Chemistry, Physics), History, Geography, Computer Science, French and Spanish. The government is encouraging the study of 5 of these subjects (English, Maths, Science are compulsory, either History or Geography, either French or Spanish. Computer Science is an additional if desired).

What if I do not know what I want to do in the future?

Keep your options open. Keep in mind that you might want to go to university or that you might want to do an apprenticeship etc. Select a range of subjects from across the curriculum e.g. a language, a humanities subject (History or Geography), an arts subject (Art, Graphics, Drama, Music) and one other subject such as PE, RS, Food, etc. Include in your selection what you are being successful in and what you enjoy doing, after all you are more likely to study harder in these subjects. Finally you may wish to pick a subject that is more practical than others that are 100% written exam. Subjects like Art, Graphics, IT, PE, Food and Media have assignments which are worth marks towards your final grade, which you must complete before your examination.

Do I need to be able to read music or play an instrument to choose GCSE Music?

Being able to read music would be an advantage although the course will teach you this. You do however have to be prepared to study an instrument as part of your course. You can select which instrument, which could be your voice if you would like to sing. To develop your skills to the appropriate standard for the course you will be required to attend additional peripatetic lessons.

I am struggling to choose which subjects to select. What do I do?

You are not alone. Speak to others to get their support. Speak to your teachers about whether you would be suited to their subject. Speak with your parents / carers, they know you well! Speak to students in the older year groups about the courses they study. You can also speak with your form tutor and our careers advisor.

What are the differences between BTEC, OCR Cambridge National and GCSE?

Each of these types of qualification are equally as challenging and are of equal value to sixth forms, colleges and employers. The differences are about the way they are assessed. GCSEs are 100% exams that are taken at the end of Year 11. BTECs and OCR Cambridge Nationals have assignments throughout the two years that earn you marks towards your final grade. You still sit an exam in Year 11. This is ideal for students who may not perform at their best in exams.

Can I change my options once I have chosen them?

You need to ensure that you are making your choices carefully, and research each subject carefully. Your options will be chosen in a one-to-one interview after the February half term. After this it is extremely difficult to change your choices and this will only occur in extraordinary circumstances.

Option Blocks

In terms of practicalities, you will see from the selection form on the last page of the booklet, that you must choose subjects from each box. **Please choose two possibilities in each option box, writing 1 beside your first choice and 2 beside your reserve choice.** We shall try our best to give you your first choice but this cannot be guaranteed which is why it is important for you to choose a reserve in each block. A form is at the end of the booklet.

For subjects with an ‘*’ next to them, teachers may have suggested you study this course because it would be of great benefit to you.

Some combinations of subjects are not allowed due to being similar in content. These are:

- Art & Design and Graphics
- IT and Computer Science

Don't hesitate to ask for help or advice – all your teachers are here to make sure you make the right decisions.

English Language

EXAM BOARD: AQA

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE English Language

WHAT IS ENGLISH LANGUAGE ABOUT?

You will study a range of both fiction and non-fiction texts and learn how to analyse these. You will develop your ability to explain the effect of different linguistic features as well as comment on the differences between Victorian Britain and 21st century Britain.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

Reading fiction texts.

Reading and comparing non-fiction Victorian prose with contemporary non-fiction prose.

Skills that you can develop include language analysis, comparative commentary and evaluation of the effectiveness of texts. You will also gain marks from creative writing and transactional writing skills questions.

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

Paper 1 (50% of final marks)

Section A: Reading a fiction text

Section B: Creative writing (50%)

Paper 2 (50% of final marks)

Section A: Reading two non-fiction texts

Section B: Transactional writing (50%)

Speaking and Listening: A filmed presentation that will take place in class. A separate certificate will be awarded for this.

EXAM BOARD: AQA

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE English Literature

WHAT IS ENGLISH LITERATURE ABOUT?

You will study a wide range of literary texts. You will gain a unique insight into those key texts. You will develop your ability to explore writers' perspectives of the world and explore how context informs the construction of narrative. You will have opportunities to evaluate these texts and negotiate how they help us make sense of the world around us.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

One Shakespeare text (*Macbeth*), a 19th Century Novel (*A Christmas Carol*), a Modern Prose text (*An Inspector Calls*) and a selection of poems (Power and Conflict cluster).

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

Paper 1 (50% of final grade) 1 hour 45 mins

Shakespeare & 19th Century Fiction,

- Two 30 mark questions on *Macbeth* and *A Christmas Carol* taught in class

Paper 2 (50% of final grade) 2 hours 15 mins

Modern Prose & Poetry,

- Two 30 mark questions on a modern text taught in class and on Power and Conflict
- Two questions on two unseen poems, the first being worth 24 marks and the second worth 8 marks

There will be some opportunities to attend the theatre to see productions of texts and listen to external speakers.

English Functional Skills

EXAM BOARD: PEARSON EdEXCEL

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: Entry level (1-3), Level 1, Level 2 Functional Skills

The Functional Skills English course is run in Year 10 as an alternative pathway to English Language GCSE. In Year 10 students will study Functional Skills English at a level appropriate to each student and then will progress into a GCSE English Language course in Year 11.

WHAT IS ENGLISH FUNCTIONAL SKILLS ABOUT?

The curriculum has been designed to inspire and motivate learners, providing appropriate opportunities to demonstrate their competence in English using real-world situations. With scheduled multiple opportunities for assessment this qualification is tailored for learners of all abilities.

The curriculum will enable learners to develop confidence in English skills, preparing them for progression into employment or further education and for use in their daily lives. The course includes reading, writing, speaking and listening units and assessments. The speaking, listening and communicating unit will emphasise the wider benefits that speaking and listening skills have for learners. It allows learners to develop their presentation and discussion skills around topics of their own choice. This will enable the full range of learners to engage in a way that is tailored to their experiences and areas of interest.

Writing tasks give learners the opportunity to produce texts of different lengths and for different audiences, building the skills needed to adapt responses to situations. Questions in reading are designed to truly assess a learner's ability to understand different texts, using question formats to minimise writing demand.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

- Reading, Writing, Speaking and listening

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE

WHAT IS MATHS ABOUT?

Maths is all around us, in everything we do. It is the building block for everything in our daily lives, including mobile devices, architecture (ancient and modern), art, money, engineering, and even sports. Since the beginning of recorded history, mathematical discovery has been at the forefront of every civilised society, and in use in even the most primitive of cultures. You are going to delve into this world of Maths which impacts every day of your life. You will be developing your problem solving strategies by studying a range of topics which we split into the following categories: Number, Algebra, Geometry and Data & Statistics. You will learn and practise mathematical language so that you can properly communicate what you have discovered.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

You will learn to:

- Identify and use the appropriate mathematical methods to solve a problem given in a context.
- Apply logical thinking to break down and solve mathematical problems.
- Manipulate and simplify algebraic expressions
- Form and solve equations.
- Carry out efficient mental and written calculations.
- Solve spatial problems involving length, area, perimeter, volume and angles.
- Transform shapes using an understanding of transformations and coordinate systems.
- Organise and represent data.
- Analyse and interpret data and draw valid conclusions.

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

Paper 1 (Non-calculator) – 33.3% of the final mark. 1 hour 30 mins exam.

Paper 2 (Calculator) – 33.3% of the final mark. 1 hour 30 mins exam.

Paper 3 (Calculator) – 33.3% of the final mark. 1 hour 30 mins exam.

HOMEWORK - 90 minutes of Sparx Maths per week.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION INC. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

Students in the top set also study for the AQA Level 2 Further Maths qualification. This is assessed by two papers sat in Year 11. This qualification introduces pupils to some A level Maths and Further Maths topics to extend their knowledge and prepare them for further study. Selected students also take part in the Intermediate Individual Maths challenge (UKMT).

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

Students intending to take Advanced level Mathematics at Preston Manor should note that a grade 7 at GCSE is required. Students intending to take advanced level Further Mathematics should note that Grade 8 at GCSE is required.

Maths Functional Skills

EXAM BOARD: Edexcel

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: Entry level (1-3), Level 1, Level 2 Functional Skills

Functional Skills Maths Offer

The Functional Skills Maths course is run in Year 10 as an alternative pathway to Mathematics GCSE.

In Year 10 they will study Functional Skills Maths at a level appropriate to each student and then will progress into a GCSE Maths course in Year 11.

WHAT IS Maths Functional Skills ABOUT?

The qualification has been designed to inspire and motivate learners, providing opportunities to develop their understanding and skills in mathematics.

The qualifications give learners the opportunity to:

- demonstrate a sound grasp of the underpinning skills and basics of mathematical problem-solving skills appropriate to the level, and the ability to apply mathematical thinking to solve problems in familiar situations
- achieve the skills for further study at GCSE
- achieve a foundation for progression into employment.

The curriculum will enable learners to become confident in their use of fundamental mathematical knowledge and skills, and give the learners an opportunity to demonstrate their understanding by applying their knowledge and skills to solve simple mathematical problems or to carry out simple tasks. It will enable students to develop an appreciation of the role played by mathematics in the world of work and in life generally.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

- Using numbers and the number system
- Using common measures, shape and space
- Handling information and data

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

Combined Science

EXAM BOARD: OCR (Gateway)

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE (DOUBLE AWARD)

WHAT IS COMBINED SCIENCE ABOUT?

Students will study biology, chemistry and physics as separate subjects and have specialised teachers for each subject. GCSE Combined Science offers the chance to develop the scientific literacy skills needed to become active and informed citizens in a modern society where science and technology play key roles in shaping lives. In lessons, students will have the opportunity to consider the issues and choices raised by technology and science. They will learn to appreciate what science has to say about people, the environment and the universe. Studying science will also allow students to develop their working scientifically skills and practise designing, investigating and evaluating experiments.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

All students will study topics in biology, chemistry and physics. Examples of topics covered are:

Biology - Respiration, Photosynthesis, Homeostasis, Ecosystems, Inheritance, Health

Chemistry - Atomic Structure, Bonding, Types of Reactions, Equilibria, Organic Chemistry

Physics - Motion, Electrostatics, Beyond Earth, Radioactivity, Wave Behaviour, Energy

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

The Combined Science GCSE Course is 100% written examination assessed. Students sit six exams at the end of year 11, each 1 hour 10 minutes long:

- Paper 1 & 2 – Biology topics (120 marks, 33.3% of the final mark)
- Paper 3 & 4 – Chemistry topics (120 marks, 33.3% of the final mark)
- Paper 5 & 6 – Physics topics (120 marks, 33.3% of the final mark)

These papers will contain multiple choice questions, short answer questions, and extended writing (4-6 marks) questions. Some questions in the paper will test practical skills relating to the required practicals, as well as scientific knowledge and understanding. Numeracy and literacy skills will also be assessed.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

All students will follow a two and a half year course (starting in Year 9) and will achieve two GCSEs for the Combined Science qualification. Foundation and Higher tier papers are both offered.

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

Students can further their study via A Level sciences or embark on a BTEC in Applied Science. These courses lead to a variety of further study opportunities at degree or apprenticeship level, involving science related careers such as medicine or dentistry.

Separate Sciences

EXAM BOARD: OCR (Gateway)

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE BIOLOGY, GCSE CHEMISTRY and GCSE PHYSICS

WHAT IS SEPARATE SCIENCE ABOUT?

GCSE separate sciences (formerly known as triple science) provide a bridge to further study science, by giving students the opportunity to develop the more advanced knowledge and understanding needed in higher education. Students will develop and hone transferable skills, as well as enhance their scientific literacy, required to be active and informed citizens in a modern society where science and technology play key roles in shaping our lives. Studying science will also allow students to develop their working scientifically skills and practise designing, investigating and evaluating experiments.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

Studying separate sciences gives students the opportunity to learn about topics in greater depth, enhancing progression and giving students a greater understanding of science. Students selected for this option will study the same topics covered in the combined science course, but with greater detail and knowledge across all areas. In biology, this will involve a greater knowledge and understanding of processes such as osmosis, protein synthesis and vision. In chemistry, students will look deeper into the Periodic Table, studying the transition metals and using flame tests and spectra to analyse elements. In physics, students will get the opportunity to study the concept of an electric field and how to use alternators and generators.

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

The GCSE Separate Science courses are 100% written examination assessed. Students will sit six exams, each 1 hour 45 minutes long:

- Paper 1 & 2 – Biology topics (180 marks, 100% of GCSE Biology final mark)
- Paper 3 & 4 – Chemistry topics (180 marks, 100% of GCSE Chemistry final mark)
- Paper 5 & 6 – Physics topics (180 marks, 100% of GCSE Physics final mark)

These papers will contain multiple choice questions, short answer questions, and extended writing (4-6 marks) questions. Some questions in the paper will test practical skills relating to the required practicals, as well as scientific knowledge and understanding. Numeracy and literacy skills will also be assessed.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Students are selected for the separate sciences based on their performance at KS3. **Studying separate science does not take up one of your options.** This route will cover topics in more detail than that covered in the combined science course. The course provides a better foundation for students wanting to study any of the sciences at A Level.

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

Students can further their study via A Level sciences or embark on a BTEC in Applied Science. These courses lead to a variety of further study opportunities at degree or apprenticeship level, involving science related careers such as medicine or dentistry.

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE Fine Art

WHAT IS FINE ART ABOUT?

The GCSE in Fine Art is an exciting and creative course that provides opportunities to develop independent ideas and gain new skills in visual communication. There is an emphasis on adventurous and enquiring approaches to art and design and producing artwork that embraces a range of ideas. You will respond to diverse artists and artworks, from contemporary practice, past practice and different cultures.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

- Increased understanding of art, craft and design.
- The ability to investigate, analyse and experiment in a range of media.
- Practical skills to express ideas and use visual language.

WHAT IS GCSE FOOD PREPARATION AND NUTRITION ABOUT?

GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition sets out the knowledge, understanding and skills required to cook and apply the principles of food science, nutrition and healthy eating.

The majority of the course is delivered through preparation and practical activities to learn about the connections between theory and practice, to apply your understanding of food and nutrition to practical preparation.

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

Task 1: NEA1 Food investigation (30 marks)

Students' understanding of the working characteristics, functional and chemical properties of ingredients in a written report (1,500–2,000 words) including photographic evidence of the practical investigation.

Task 2: NEA 2 Food preparation assessment (70 marks) - 3 hour practical exam

Students' knowledge, skills and understanding in relation to the planning, preparation, cooking, presentation of food and application of nutrition related to the chosen task. Students will prepare, cook and present a final menu of three dishes within a single period of no more than three hours, planning in advance how this will be achieved. Written or electronic portfolio including photographic evidence. Photographic evidence of the three final dishes must be included.

Written theory exam: 1 hour 45 minutes

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE AND THEORY EXAM?

Theoretical knowledge of food preparation and nutrition from the following topics:

- Food, nutrition and health
- Food science
- Food safety
- Food choice
- Food provenance

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION INC. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

Students will be expected to attend intervention after school and required to work independently to complete certain theory based investigations and tasks. Pupils contribute to the local community by preparing food for some cultural events.

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

Students who do GCSE Food Nutrition and Preparation could move on to do an A level in Food Nutrition and Science and progress on to a science degree related subject which can lead to gaining professions in a wide range of career paths. Geography

EXAM BOARD: Exdecel (Syllabus B)

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE

WHAT IS GEOGRAPHY ABOUT?

You will study a range of topics about the world around you. You will gain a unique insight into different cultures and how they interact with the environment, including how to reduce their impact on the environment. You will develop your ability to explain the effect that different human and physical processes can have on the environment and evaluate the sustainability of how humans are using different environments around the world. Geography complements other written subjects such as Biology, Chemistry and History.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

- 1. Global Geographical Issues** – includes the study of hazardous earth, development and the challenges of an urbanising world.
- 2. UK Geographical Issues** – includes the study of the UK's evolving physical and human landscapes and the **undertaking of compulsory** physical and human fieldwork, which students will have to answer questions on in the exam.

Paper 3 – People & Environmental Issues: Making Geographical Decisions - 1 hour 30 mins (64 marks) = 25% of total

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION INC. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

Students are exposed to issues and environments outside of their everyday experience through opportunities for fieldwork and investigations, which allows them to consider our changing world and their role within it. Students who are interested in some of the major issues facing the world today, e.g., climate change, meeting future energy demands, migration, rising populations, and development, will find geography interesting and stimulating. Students will go on two compulsory field trips for Paper 2, and they may have the opportunity for other visits or enrichment activities.

This course gives you the chance to develop your skills as a performer and composer, and to widen your knowledge of musical styles and techniques. You will also develop skills in using music technology to aid the creation of your own music. Programs used include Logic (the music industry standard) and Sibelius. You will also have first priority access to the Music Academy, English National Opera's youth projects which cover a range of creative disciplines not just opera.

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

A GCSE in Music is a good basis for and compliment to all kinds of courses in Performing Arts and may also lead on to specialist Music and Music Technology A Levels. Thinking further ahead, top universities also favour applicants for all subject areas with qualifications in music. Previous Preston Manor students with a GCSE Music have gone on to become producers, recording studio managers, singer-songwriters and run business accounts for Yamaha Music in both this country and abroad.

Modern Foreign Languages

EXAM BOARD: EDEXCEL

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE French or Spanish

WHAT IS MFL ABOUT?

Learning a foreign language is an exciting, challenging and rewarding experience. Not only do you learn about other cultures and countries but languages improve your ability to communicate with new and interesting people. Furthermore, learning languages provides you with extremely useful skills such as: communication, confidence, creativity, problem solving and improving your memory.

Living in or around Wembley, you are surrounded by people who speak different languages and we are sure that you have noticed that it makes the place far more interesting and welcoming.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

Questions across all four language skills are set in common contexts, addressing a range of relevant contemporary and cultural themes. They are organised into five themes, each broken down into topics and sub-topics.

The six themes are:

- My personal world
- Lifestyle and wellbeing
- My neighbourhood
- Media and technology
- Studying and my future
- Travel and tourism

Each theme contains a series of sub-themes that will enable you to develop real life, transferable language skills.

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

There is a Foundation Tier (grades 1–5) and a Higher Tier (grades 4–9). You must take all four question papers at the same tier. All question papers must be taken in the same series.

- Writing Exam 25% of final mark
- Speaking: 25% of final mark
- Reading: 25% of final mark
- Listening: 25% of final mark

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION INC. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

You will have the opportunity to talk to native speakers and work in collaboration with others. You may have the possibility to go on a trip abroad.

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

BTEC Performing Arts (Dance)

EXAM BOARD: EDEXCEL

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: Level 1/2 BTEC TECH Award in Performing Arts

WHAT IS DANCE ABOUT?

You will study a range of dance styles and professional works that will give you the opportunity to develop specific knowledge and the practical skills necessary to enter the Performing Arts industry.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

We study professional works for example, Jazz (Chicago) Contemporary/Jazz (Alvin Ailey) and Street /K-Pop/Hip Hop Styles (Diversity, Black Pink and Matt Steffanina). You will develop your technical and interpretative abilities, such as increasing flexibility, improving posture and enhancing your creative ability. You will improve your coordination and communication skills, as well as your movement memory.

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

Component 1: Exploring the Performing Arts: 30% - Teacher Assessed You research 3 different professional choreographers and learn their work in order to create a 5-minute powerpoint presentation and a 1000-word extended essay (Which can be done on audio or video vlog).

Component 2: Developing skills and techniques in the Performing Arts: 30% - Teacher Assessed. You learn and perform professional pieces of choreography that are at least 2 minutes long and perform them to a live audience as a solo or group. You will keep a video rehearsal/ performance log and an audio evaluation.

Component 3: Performing to a brief: 40% - External Examiner Assessment. You will use your dance techniques within rehearsal and performance to explore, develop and perform your own piece of group choreography. This is based on a theme given by the exam board. You will complete **an extended piece of writing, scrapbook or audio showing**, your research and development, of the creative process and an overall evaluation of your performance.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION INC. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

Dance students take part in the Largest Dance Event in the World: **Move It'**, they participate in Dance Workshop Days with dance professionals and other performing artists from the Performing arts Industry. Dancers attend external dance classes and numerous theatre trips throughout the year. They choreograph and perform for live audiences in and around Brent. Students may also be given the opportunity to obtain a Dance Leaders level 2 Qualification well established and recognised by Colleges / Sixth forms

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

You can go on to study A/AS Level or Level 3 in Dance/Performing Arts/Media. From there you can go on to accomplish a Dance Degree at University or audition for a performing arts school or work within the industry. Qualification can lead to a career as Sports Therapist, Professional Dancer, Choreographer, Teacher or Doctor of Movement to name but a few.

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: Entry Level 3 Award to Level 2 Certificate

WHAT IS PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT AND EMPLOYABILITY (PDE) ABOUT?

Prince's Trust have worked closely with young people over the last 40 years to develop key work skills to support them to successfully move on to employment, education and training. You will engage in learning through teamwork, developing skills, attitudes and qualities that are essential for work and employment. This programme gives you the opportunity to develop skills that are relevant to your future work life. You will also develop English and Maths skills through embedded Literacy, Language and Numeracy (LLN) and STEM support.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

All activities are set by the centre to meet the level requirements detailed in the unit assessment criteria.

You will take part in various modules and be part of practical assignments and presentations while completing a portfolio of evidence. There will be a variety of chances to engage with The Prince's Trust as they will visit school for talks and we will have the opportunity to work with outside speakers from a variety of different workplaces such as banks, courts of law, local business, sports groups, prisons, local community, charity/ volunteer sector.

Physical Education

EXAM BOARD: AQA

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE

WHAT IS PHYSICAL EDUCATION ABOUT?

This subject will provide you with an interesting and challenging learning experience above that of just playing sport. You will be introduced to key sporting ideas and shown how these interact through practical and theoretical settings. Through the combination of practical and theory lessons you will develop your transferable skills including, decision making, psychological understanding of performers and analytical skills.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

- Paper 1 - Applied Anatomy and Physiology, Movement Analysis and Physical Training.
- Paper 2 - Sports Psychology, Socio-cultural influences and Health, Fitness and well-being.
- Non exam assessment - You will be assessed in 3 different sports and complete 1 piece of controlled assessment based on analysis and evaluation

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

60% of the marks are available from the 2 exam papers, which are 1 hour 15 minutes each, and are taken at the end of Y11.

30% of the marks are available from your practical performance in three practical activities. In the practical element of the course both individual skills and full game ability are assessed.

10% of the marks are available for controlled assessment coursework from the analysis and evaluation of sporting performance.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION INC. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

You will have the opportunity to enhance your practical ability in a wide range of sports, and to experience other sports and activities for the first time. There will be opportunities to represent Preston Manor in competitive fixtures against other schools, and you will be encouraged to participate in sport either within school or for external clubs.

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

The study of GCSE Physical Education opens up a range of possibilities for further study such as A Level Physical Education and A Level Psychology, plus vocational courses such as BTEC Sport and Sport and Exercise Science. Associated careers include Teaching or Sports Coaching, Sports Management, Nutrition, Physiotherapy, Fitness instructor and Professional Sport.

Religious Studies

EXAM BOARD: AQA (Syllabus A)

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE

WHAT IS RELIGIOUS STUDIES ABOUT?

Our GCSE covers study of two major world religions: Christianity and Islam, and four contemporary ethical themes ensuring that you have a diverse choice of subjects to explore. You will be challenged with questions about belief, values, meaning, purpose and truth, enabling you to develop your own attitudes towards religious issues.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

You will be studying beliefs, teachings and practices of **two religions in depth**: Christianity and Islam as well as elements of other religions.

You will also explore **four Thematic Studies**:

- **Relationships and families**: sex before marriage, contraception and homosexuality.
- **Religion and life**: abortion, euthanasia, animal experimentation.
- **Religion, peace and conflict**: violence, weapons of mass destruction and pacifism.
- **Religion, crime and punishment**: corporal punishment, death penalty and forgiveness.

You will develop analytical and critical thinking skills, the ability to work with abstract ideas, leadership and research skills. All these skills will help prepare you for further study.

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

GCSE Religious Studies is assessed only by exam – there is no coursework.

Exams are taken at the end of Year 11. There are TWO RS exams- 1 hour 45 minutes long each.

Exams have four questions each made of five-parts: multiple choice (1 mark); two examples (2 marks); two developed reasons answer (4 marks); two developed reasons answer including a reference to religious teachings (5 marks); and an essay (12 marks).

Paper 1 (50%) **Christianity and Islam**

Paper 2 (50%) **Thematic Studies**

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION INC. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

You will also gain an appreciation of how religion, philosophy and ethics form the basis of our culture. We live in a diverse society: understanding religious beliefs, ideas and outlooks, means we can understand the world in which we live.

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

You can go on to study A Level Religious Studies, Philosophy and Ethics. This course is a written subject which develops skills of logical reasoning, the use and interpretation of evidence, evaluation and communication. GCSE Religious Studies is useful for a wide range of careers including law, journalism, medicine, media, social work and teaching.

Sociology

EXAM BOARD: AQA

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: GCSE

WHAT IS SOCIOLOGY ABOUT?

You will study a range of topics about the social world. Sociology explores the different processes, social issues and social structures that happen in society. Sociology offers an understanding of family life, education, stratification, poverty, politics, work, unemployment, population, urbanisation and crime – in other words a broad analysis of how we live together in modern society.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

The Family, Education, Crime and Deviance, Social Stratification and Research Methods. Skills that you can develop include evaluating different arguments on the way society is structured and you will learn to analyse key issues in society.

HOW IS THE SUBJECT ASSESSED?

100% of the marks are gained from 2 exam papers and will require you to use your knowledge of sociological research methods:

- Paper 1: You will be examined on Family and Education. (50% of the final marks)
- Paper 2: You will be examined on Crime and Deviance and Social Stratification. (50% of the final marks)

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION INC. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES:

Throughout the course there will be opportunities for you to have in class debates about issues such as racism, poverty and gender discrimination. You should be actively reading and watching the news to stay up to date with the key issues in society.

FURTHER STUDIES AND CAREERS:

You can go on to study A Level Sociology. The subject links with many different careers including Law, Social work, Personnel Management, Psychology, Media/Journalism.

Study Support

EXAM BOARD: AQA

QUALIFICATION AWARDED: Unit Award Scheme Certification

WHAT IS STUDY SUPPORT ABOUT?

Unit Award Scheme (UAS) is linked to the learners' GCSE option choices. They are a stand-alone certification which records the learners' progression through their various GCSE options. UAS can help learners with progression to:

- further study
- employment
- independent living
- more active involvement in society

It is shown to motivate, encourage, engage, support and raise self esteem and can reward achievement which might otherwise go unrecognised, eg small steps or non-mainstream subjects.

Certification:

- Each time a unit is achieved, a Unit Award Certificate is issued.
- They don't show a level - UAS is not a qualification - but instead show the detail of what the student has achieved in completing the unit.
- They provide a great talking point for the learner about what they've done, e.g. during an interview for a college place or employment.

Additionally, you will further develop your skills in literacy, numeracy & social communication. Study Support provides an opportunity for over-learning and consolidation of key concepts in core subjects such as English and Maths to improve your outcomes at GCSE and to support students to have the variety of skills needed to meet their target grades. You will have the opportunity to work in small targeted groups and gain valuable skills that will be used across all of your subjects.

WHAT TOPICS / SKILLS ARE COVERED IN THE COURSE?

- Comprehension skills.
- Study skills: note taking, mind-mapping, organising & recording information.
- Communication skills in reading, writing, speaking and listening.
- Research skills: locating key information.
- Writing organisation: academic essay writing techniques.
- Revision skills: how to revise using a range of strategies suitable to your learning style.
- Exam technique: how to work effectively in exams and memory strategies.
- Personal development: organisation, personal finance, social and communication skills.
- Self awareness: identifying strengths and interests.
- Post 16 Options: support researching and applying for Colleges/ Sixth Form/ Apprenticeships, CV's and application forms.
