BOUGHT –She bought many books on the subject of feminism for the LRC.


Jack Petchey Leader Award

He now has the pleasure of applying for a grant for $\pounds750$ to spend on something for the school. So watch this space to see what he will spend the money on.....



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
The behaviour panel received some excellent news at the beginning of the summer term from the Anti-Bullying Alliance. The Panel had taken part in the 'All Together Programme' which helps school tackle bullying. We had to complete an audit of the school's current practises and then carry out a survey to find out what the students felt about the bullying in our school and to highlight any areas of the school that was a hotspot for bad behaviour.

Having completed the survey, we then had to write an action plan, to improve our school practise. This included introducing a one-way system in the corridor to ensure that students weren't creating a log jam and there was a continuous movement of students, preventing students from being squashed or injured. We also had to ensure that the parents had a chance to comment and amend the schools anti-bullying policy.

All these steps were put in place and then we had to carry out another survey to see if the changes had made a difference.

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Peer Mentors (PM's)

Peer mentors attended a whole days training on how to engage with mentees, communicate effectively, resolve issues, making good choices and managing the mentoring relationship. Peer mentors also attended sessions run by external professionals on LGBT, consequences of Exclusion, far right extremism, radicalisation, grooming and, Identity and Belonging at the Civic centre.

This experience gives the students a great foundation to start to build their mentoring relationships on.

26 mentors and 26 mentees went on the Peer Mentoring trip, along with 6 members of staff.


The students were booked into two events at the Science museum. The first event was a science show all about different types of Gasses, liquids, chemicals and lots more. The students were called up to help with demonstrations which they really enjoyed.



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The second event we booked was a trip to the 'Wonderlab'. This is a place where students are allowed to touch and try out all of the exhibits.





The Wonderlab had over 50 hands-on exhibits, the gallery includes live experiments at the Chemistry Bar, lightning demos at the giant Tesla coil, slides, and our brilliant Explainers to facilitate engagement.

The mentees also got to explore the museum independently with their mentors. This was the perfect opportunity for the mentors and mentees to get to know each other.

All mentors and mentees had a great time at the Science museum and were perfectly behaved. The staff received numerous compliments from other schools and the public about how calm and polite our students were.

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The Peer mentors did a great job working with their mentees and we saw a great improvement in attitude, managing emotions and behaviour from mentees.

The Covid -19 situation put a halt to the mentoring sessions but PM's submitted heartfelt voice messages saying goodbye and reassuring mentees that they will see each other in September for an end of peer mentoring party with pizza! Mr. Carboo will be sending out these messages at the end of term.

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BBC and STARS annual celebration



This year's S.T.A.R.S. and B.B.C. Celebration was the biggest and best ever! Mr. Carboo runs the B.B.C. and S.T.A.R.S. groups put together a show that was action packed. Volunteer Hepburn Harrison–Graham who runs workshops with the B.B.C. co-presented the show.

There were over 100 families members/guests and numerous staff that attended this event. The show consisted of a short film, a parents quiz, Golden awards ceremony, speeches, presentations, recap of all the BBC achievements over the last year, and a live spoken word show.
